





Baltic sea connects!

From 27.06. to 01.07.2014. 11th grade students from Aizputes secondary school – Oskars Otaņķis, Ieva Ozola, Krista Petrēvica, Jurģis Toms Liepiņš – and biology teacher Vika Vasiļevska participated in a summer camp in Estonia in the framework of the Baltic Sea Project (BSP). The Baltic Sea Project brings together nine countries located around the Baltic sea.

Goal of the camp was to find out new things from different lecturers about the Baltic sea, do research work, communicate with foreigners and learn something new about culture of: Lithuania, Estonia, Denmark, Germany, Poland.

The camp took place in Estonia, camping called "Roosta", two hour drive from Parnu. Students were sharing houses regardless of the nationalities. Camp schedule: in morning students participated in lectures and activies, in the evening every nation presented their culture by singing, dancing and playing games.

Students impressions about the camp:

We had lectures, laboratory works and practical tasks on a seashore every day. Research worker Jonne Kotta introduced us with Baltic sea problems and solutions for them, for example, how to reduce distribution of blue-green algea. While wearing specialised waterproof suits we were able to find different species of plants and animals on seashore. Very interesting was another lecture about climate change influence of Baltic sea – how has changed the Baltic sea shore line in decades. Lecturer Kristiina Nurkse guided laboratory work in which we aqustioned makrology and chromatography using green, brown and red algae pigments. While zooplankton researcher Lennart Lennuk taught us how to make zooplankton net and indetify caught species by ourselves. Bird watching (Marko Valker, MeelisUustal), investigation of shore plants (MarjeLoide), comics characters (Diana Tamm, Veronika Svištš) and much more other activities educated us during the camp.
